

General Overview of the Community-Based Outreach Efforts: "Boots on the Ground"

- Two (2) Community <u>Navigators</u>
 - Connect individuals to needed services (NSMH)
- Recovery <u>Support Services</u> Team
 - Support individuals with basic needs (CAPIC)
- Continuum of Care Case Managers (CAPIC)
 - Follow individuals through their recovery process
- <u>Harm Reduction</u> Efforts (Healthy Streets)
 - Provide Narcan, Clean Needles, Condums
- Chelsea "<u>HUB</u>" (Canadian Model)
- <u>Downtown Task Force</u> (Community-based model)

Coordinate the community-based resources of <u>ALL Downtown stakeholders</u> to remove persistent public safety and health concerns including addressing the opioid epidemic in the city of Chelsea.

Four (<u>4</u>) CPD Patrol Officers Assigned/Dedicated to a Specific High Crime Area



Innovative Problem Solving is Key Based on the "SARA" Methodology





The Downtown Task Force Assisted The CPD Drug Unit, With A Very Successful Covert Operation this Summer.

(15) Problem Individuals From The Downtown Area have been Implicated in the open-air street sales of Heroin.

Majority Of Individuals Involved Have Been Placed Into Custody via Arrest Warrants by CPD

Successfully Obtained Stay Away Orders For All Involved

Police Enforcement on "Street Dealers"



Working With District Court

- Obtaining <u>Stay Away Orders</u> For Repeat Offenders.
- Obtaining <u>Section 35's</u> For Individuals Who Consistently Refuse Help
- Lost the power of self-control
- Alcohol / Substance Abuse
- Petition Court: Police, bloodrelative, Physician
- Warrant of Apprehension (5 days)
- Treated < 90 days

<u>Goal</u>: of Improving The *Quality Of Life* In The Downtown Area




Chelsea Hub? :

The Hub is a team that meets weekly and identifies individuals or families that are at "acutely" elevated levels of risk.

Chelsea Hub – Canadian Model

- Everyone is at the Table
- Teams are mobilized to mitigate/reduce risk
- Updates are provided the following week which increases accountability
- Case management happens with participating agencies and NOT at the Hub table itself
- Approaching 300 individuals connected to needed services since August of 2015
- This is an absolute "Game Changer"
