State Revolving Fund Loan Program

Purpose: Federal-State partnership to finance water infrastructure and other projects to protect or improve public health, water quality and environmental resources

Rate: Standard 2% Interest Loans. 0% for qualifying Nutrient Removal projects.

Term: Standard 20 year, up to 30 years with a MA Registered P.E. –certification of extended useful life of the asset.

Eligible Borrowers: cities, towns, public water suppliers, and wastewater districts.

Mass Clean Water Trust

The Clean Water Trust is a Massachusetts legislative creation tasked to administer the Clean Water and Drinking Water State Revolving Fund Loan Programs.

Trustees:

- Treasurer, Receiver General of the Commonwealth
- Secretary, Executive Office of Administration and Finance
- Commissioner, Mass Department of Environmental Protection

SRF Project Selection Criteria

- Public Health
 - Exposures
 - Frequencies
 - Seriousness

- Environmental Impacts
 - Resource affected
 - Frequency
 - Seriousness

SRF Criteria (cont.)

- Project Effectiveness
 - Reduction in violations
 - Restoration of designated use
 - Protects resources/ prevents problems

SRF Criteria (cont.)

- Planning for Project
 - Needs analyzed
 - Options reviewed
 - Recommended option selected

- Programmatic concerns
 - Compliance and Enforcement issues
 - Regional solutions
 - Energy efficiency/ renewables
 - Innovative approaches

Competing for SRF Loans

CWSRF

- \$350M-\$450M annually
- Avg. 78 applications/yr.
- Avg. 66 selected for IUP
- Attrition rate 49%
- Bypass projects (moved up to funded list) 3/yr
- Odds of winding up on a list 89%
- Range of loans
 \$200,000 to \$38M

DWSRF

- \$100M-\$125M annually
- Avg. 67 applications/yr.
- Avg. 54 selected for IUP
- Attrition rate 33%
- Bypass projects (moved up to funded list) 5/yr
- Odds of winding up on a list 88%
- Range of loans \$250,000 to \$21M

Project eligibilities

<u>Clean Water Projects</u>

- Planning
 - Wastewater
 - Storm water
 - Integrated
- Septic system replacement
- Stormwater management
- WWTP upgrades
- Combined Sewer Overflow mitigation
- Infiltration and Inflow reduction
- Green Infrastructure
- Decentralized wastewater systems
- Sewer rehabilitation and/or expansion
- Landfill capping
- Brownfields –water quality

Drinking Water Projects

- Planning
- Water Treatment Plant rehabilitation and/or upgrades
- Finished water storage
- Distribution system repairs and improvements
- System Security measures

2014 State Water Infrastructure Bill Ch 259 of the Acts of 2014

Authorized

- Local tech assistance grants
- State cost share for fee to join a regional water system
- Enhanced subsidies for certain categories of SRF loans
 - Regional approaches
 - Green infrastructure
 - Innovative technology
 - Repair from natural disaster
 - Relief for PWS affected by contaminated groundwater
- Regional Water Entity Reimbursement Fund

- Appropriated
 - Tech Assistance and Planning Grants
 - \$400K/ year since 2015
 - \$40K maximum grant
 - 35 grants issued
 - Used for
 - Asset management planning
 - CWMP
 - Green Infrastructure opportunities

SRF and Ch 259 (cont.)

- Promulgating amendments to CWSRF regulations at 310 CMR 44, DWSRF regulations at 310 CMR 45
 - Publishing to Central Register in January 2017
 - Insure consistency with Federal WRRDA
 - Detail specifics of what projects qualify for enhanced subsidy and how.
 - Additional subsidy is subject to legislative appropriation.
