

Goals & Objectives

- Maximize federal revenue available to respond to the COVID-19 pandemic
 - Maximize the utility of dollars based on constraints such as eligible uses, timing, and availability of resources
- Minimize compliance risks associated with these funds
 - Avoid recoupment by ensuring compliance with all relevant rules and regulations



Key Data Points

- About **\$71 billion** is available to Massachusetts through five pieces of COVID-related legislation adopted to date
- Very preliminary estimates suggest aid in Biden bill may be worth about an additional \$40 billion for MA

Overview

- Business support, unemployment insurance, and stimulus checks represent 78 percent of federal aid to Massachusetts
- Most of the federal aid flowing through the state came in the form of **expansions to existing federal grants**
 - These programs typically provide the Commonwealth with little discretion over the uses of the funds (e.g. formula grants)
- Though more than 175 federal grants have been created or expanded by COVID legislation, only about 35 or 20 percent, offer some degree of flexibility for the Commonwealth to direct these funds to needs

Overview

Critical Relief for State and Local Governments

 The Coronavirus Relief Fund (CvRF) enacted as part of the CARES Act offers the most flexibility to the Commonwealth, but is still subject to <u>significant federal</u> <u>limitations and compliance obligations</u>

> Capped amount paid as an advance



• The Federal Emergency Management Agency's Public Assistance grant program ("FEMA PA") provides reimbursement for emergency protective measures to secure life safety and support disaster response

> Uncapped amount paid as reimbursement




CvRF Budget Highlights

- MA received **\$2.7 B** in CvRF
 - \$956 M to transfer to other governments (cities, counties, towns, and school districts)
 - > \$781 M allocated for economic assistance
 - \$510 M in spending on public health and medical expenses
 - \$368 M for first responder pay and hazard pay
 - > \$71 M in other expenses

Overview

- The Commonwealth serves as a conduit for making federal resources available to municipalities and school districts (LEAs)
- Over **\$2 B** in federal resources have been allocated to municipalities and local education agencies to date
 - > **\$900 M** for municipalities, primarily via CvRF
 - > \$1.1 B available to LEAs, primarily via ESSER » \$735 M via ESSER II

Coronavirus Relief Fund



- The federal Coronavirus Relief Fund (CvRF) is administered by the US Department of the Treasury
- Federal oversight is provided by the US Treasury Office of Inspector General
- Chapter 124 of the Acts of 2020 created the Massachusetts Coronavirus Relief Fund to receive and spend federal CvRF resources without further appropriation

Eligible Uses

Necessary as a result of the public health emergency caused by COVID-19 as defined by specific Treasury guidance¹

Not budgeted as of March 27, 2020 Funds may not be used as revenue replacement

Beneficial use of the expense received during the covered period beginning March 1, 2020 and ending December 31, 2021

- FEMA PA typically provides **75 percent** reimbursement for eligible expenses
- The President's 1/21/21 Executive Order increases the reimbursement rate to 100 percent for the entire COVID-19 disaster incident period, currently defined as January 20, 2020 to September 30, 2021



FEMA PA for Municipalities

- Prior to President's EO, A&F expected \$218 M from FEMA PA for municipalities
- Rate increase worth an additional \$70 M for munis in the form of additional CvRF resources available to allocate

Note: Local accountants or auditors will need to re-align sources and uses to account for FEMA changes

Outstanding Issues

- President's EO appears to expand FEMA PA eligible costs, but key questions remain outstanding:
 - > PPE awaiting further guidance; may cover non-first responders
 - > Cleaning and sanitation costs awaiting further guidance



- School Reopening costs awaiting further guidance
 - »HVAC? Transportation? Surveillance testing?
- These items **matter a lot** to municipal FEMA PA applications

9/15/2020 Eligibility Changes

- FEMA **narrowed** eligibility to PPE for first responders only, excluding teachers, publicfacing staff, and other critical public servants
- Cleaning and sanitation costs limited to the initial costs of opening a school only; does not support ongoing enhanced cleaning costs necessary to keep schools open amid pandemic



Minimizing Compliance Risk- Key Concerns



Case Study: Hazard Pay

- Municipality provided hazard pay to public employees to provide continuity of critical public services
 - Hazard pay was collectively bargained pre-COVID
 - Paid pre-agreed incremental rate for states of emergency only to employees who were not able to work remotely
 - Did not track employee time per incident of working on COVID
- Independent auditor deemed costs ineligible for CvRF

Waste, Fraud, and Abuse – intentional or unintentional misuse of federal funds in a manner that does not comply with federal guidance, rules, and regulations

Duplication of Benefits – a form of fraud in which the federal government is charged twice for the same expense

Audit Findings – federally

mandated single audit identifies noncompliant practices or activities with federal funds, inviting further scrutiny from federal auditors **Recoupment** – process by which the federal government recoups federal funds used in a non-compliant fashion, usually via deductions from federal support for other ongoing activities (Medicaid, etc.)

Key Takeaways

- 1. Everything is in motion, so the strategy to maximize revenue and minimize risk keeps moving, too
 - > Priorities change as the response changes
 - Federal rules change regarding eligibility, required documentation, or other issues
- 2. Additional federal resources force reallocations
 - More than \$400 M is flowing to Massachusetts for rental relief (ERAP)
 - May be an opportunity to free up CvRF for some municipalities

Federal Guidance is a Moving Target

- The CvRF guidance was first published in April 2020; since that time, there were
 16 updates or changes to the guidance
- Program design for the Emergency Rental Assistance Program (ERAP) started before federal guidance for the program was issued



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
