VISION


We strive to end hunger by addressing with our partners the systemic causes and immediate impacts of food insecurity.








Food Insecurity in MA: Now 1 in 3

DRIVERS OF FOOD PANTRY USE

Why new food pantry users started using pantries in 2021

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Increased cost of groceries	54%
Decreased income	42%
Quarantined due to COVID-19	28%
Healthcare expenses	24%
Only recently learned about food pantries/banks	21%
Lost federal assistance	20%
Lost housing/housing costs increased	20%
Additional childcare expenses	12%

Why food pantry users stopped using pantries in 2021

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Increased federal food assistance	35%
Household income increased	25%
Received help from family or friends	23%
I can't get there when it's open	21%
Too hard to get to	21%
Don't like the food	19%



Living on a "Minimum wage diet"


- Life "on the edge"

- Privately Funded Food Pantries
- Help from Family and Friends





Why people aren't using food resources

- Stigma
 - I want to support myself
 - I feel embarrassed
 - I am worried others will find out
 - Maybe others need it more
- Knowledge and Convenience
 - I don't know where to go
 - I don't have the time
 - Is it worth it?
- Eligibility Concerns
 - Not sure I am eligible
 - I am worried about the information I need to share
 - I am worried that applying will affect my immigration status







New Strategies: Many Here to Stay

Before- Equality Lens:

- Everyone comes to the pantry or community supper
- Offer the same food to all

Now- Equity Lens:

- Multiple ways to distribute including mobile programs, prepared meals to go
- Culturally and medically appropriate food

 Nutritious Prepared Meals
- Curbside pickup by appointment
- Safe, Convenient, Private

- Brazilian Immigrant Community
- Preferred culturally appropriate foods
- Hudson Health Dept
 - Housing Authority food drop site
 - Last mile delivery from truck to door
- Assembleia de Deus de Hudson
 - Pop-up market after Sunday services
 - Church run distribution





Healthy Helpings Meal Program

- Low Income Individuals with Heart Disease
- Councils on Aging
- DASH* diet prepared meals
- Grab-and-go at COAs and Public Housing Sites









Home Delivery to Asian American Elders

- Low Income Elders without Transportation

- Culturally Appropriate Foods

Other Open Table Programs

- Support for Afghan, Haitian, Ukrainian Refugees
 - Culturally Appropriate Food
 - Kitchen pantry "starter kits"
 - International Institute of New England
- Kids Summer Lunch and Snack Program
 - Meals for children during the summer break
 - Boys & Girls Club, Town Recreation Depts
- Supplemental meals for low income, minority students
 - Frozen meals to go home with on Fridays
 - Robinson Community School (Lowell)
