



# FY2024 Budget

\$56 billion bill, Signed into Law

- UGGA won a 3.2% increase, \$39.3M above last year
- **Chapter 70** doubling per pupil funding for "minimum aid" districts
- Special Education Circuit Breaker \$504M
- Charter School Reimbursements \$232M, to meet state's obligation
- **PILOT** for State-owned land \$51.5M
- Rural School Aid \$15M
- **Regional School Transportation** (90%) \$97M
- McKinney-Vento Transportation (100%) \$82.5M
- **Out-of-District Vocational Transportation** (17%, up from 6%) \$1M



# Surtax Revenue in FY24 Budget

Anticipated surtax revenue ~\$1B for FY24 (Transportation/Education)

- \$100M in supplemental funding for **local roads and bridges**
- \$100M in **MSBA extraordinary relief costs**
- \$50M Green School Works grants for green infrastructure
- Codifies **universal school meals**



# Tax Relief Package

- HDIP Increases the cap on Housing Development Incentive Program tax credits: \$10m → \$30m annually (up to \$57M one-time);
  - allows for redistribution if underutilized in future years
- Low Income Housing Tax Credit raises authorization  $$40m \rightarrow $60m$
- Creates a **local-option property tax exemption** for residential properties that are rented to affordable households set by community
- Title V, Septic System Tax Credit triples maximum credit  $6k \rightarrow 18k$  for high costs of septic tank replacement/repair



# Tax Relief Package

- Senior Tax work-off property tax deduction:  $$1,500 \rightarrow $2,000$
- Senior Circuit Breaker property tax credit:  $\$750 \rightarrow \$1,500$  per year
- Other items:
  - $\circ$  Child and Dependent Tax Credit: \$180  $\rightarrow$  \$310  $\rightarrow$  \$440, per dependent
  - Earned Income Tax Credit; lowers the tax rate on short-term capital gains; rental deduction; & other credits for renters & commuters
  - Amends Chapter 62F disbursements



# **Road and Bridge Funding**

### Celebrating \$325M for Road and Bridge Funding

- Resources through 3 primary areas:
  - **\$200 million** for Chapter 90 via bond bill
  - **\$25 million** for a new Rural Roads Supplemental allocation
  - \$100 million for the surtax-funded Ch. 90 supplement in the budget
     + other bond authorizations for existing grant accounts



# Road and Bridge Funding

### 6 additional grant programs, \$25 million each:

- Municipal Pavement Program
- Municipal Small Bridge Program
- Complete Streets Funding Program
- Municipal grants for infrastructure focused on the enhancement of mass transit by bus
- Funding for the study, design, construction or improvements that increase access to mass transit and commuter rail stations
- Grants to municipalities and regional transit authorities to support fleet electrification



# Energy and the Environment

### • Municipal Aggregation

- Investigation introduces expedited pathway for approval within 120 days
- Concerns over potential loss of local control
- Technical Session: Dec. 20, 9:30AM, DPU Office, Boston
- PFAS, Water + Sewer Updates
  - U.S. EPA expected to finalize new national drinking water regulations for 6 PFAS
  - Updated Title 5 septic and sewer regulations



# **Regulatory Updates**

### • Cannabis

- Finalized regulations on HCAs, CIFs and social equity
- Social consumption regulations next

### • MBTA Communities

- Mixed-use development allowed
- 13 additional grant programs will take compliance into account



# Housing

### • Housing Bond Bill

- $\circ$  \$4.12 billion
- Mix of bonding authorizations & policy

### • Migrant Shelter Supports

- Emergency declaration, Nat'l Guard
- 7,500 family cap



# FY23 Closeout Supplemental Budget

### • FY23 Closeout Supp- in Conference Committee

- Emergency Shelter Assistance- \$250M
- Muni Finance Changes- opioid settlement clarity
- Special Education Extraordinary Relief- \$75M
- Disaster Relief
  - Funding- \$10m/\$15m
  - Amortization allowance
- Early voting grants \$5m
- 2024 state primary date, Sept. 3



# FY25 Outlook

### • FY25 Consensus Revenue Forecast

- Consensus Revenue Hearing typically held in December
- Hear from Gov't leaders, economists re: forecast
- Sec. of A&F and JWM Chairs will announce percentage in January

### • Federal Funds

• ARPA will come to a close, BIL and IRA will ramp up
